

(An Editorial in the Chicago Evening American. Arthur W. Brisbane, Editor.)

The machine that reproduces the human voice, musical instruments, all music, and dramatic power, is to the human race a discovery as great as the printing press, which gave us the printing of cheap books.

The extraordinary inventions for artistic automatic piano playing are equally valuable and marvelous in their benefits to the race, in their spreading of education.

The work of the greatest musicians, and the technical skill of the greatest artists can be reproduced at will, adding to the production the player's own temperament and feeling—without undergoing the long years of tedious, painful preparation and study, and without undergoing the torture of imperfect performance.

The machine that reproduces the human voice, and the machine that reproduces the piano recitals of the greatest artists of this age, are the greatest intellectual triumphs of this age. They mean more to the human race even than the flying machine or the wireless telegraph. For those are mechanical instruments, dealing only with the physical problems and the physical part of man. The marvelous inventions that put the musician's genius and the artistic talent of the professional performer within the reach of all are aids to the human intellect—and those are the most important of all aids.

The self-respecting man would scarcely admit that he lives in a house without books.

Just as great a misfortune—greater, even, for young people and for children—is to live in a house without the modern miracle of art, the machine that talks and sings, the piano that contains within itself, or the machine that gives a voice to the millions of pianos that are dumb because none in the household can make them speak.

In ancient days few men—only the rich—could own good books.

Each book was written by hand, illustrated by hand. Men traveled thousands of miles to visit the library, and the burning of a library was a misfortune for the whole of civilization.

Today the poorest man may own the greatest books. The intellectual genius of all ages is on the shelf, asking only to be taken and made part of the owner.

As it was with books and the thoughts of the greatest writers, so it was, until recently, with music and the genius of the great musician.

Music was for the few. Year after year of painful study was necessary to enable the individual to reproduce, even in a faulty manner, the creations of genius.

Concerts and operas were few and expensive. The knowledge of the best music throughout the country was practically NIL.

Today, thanks to the invention of the machine that speaks, not only the greatest music, but the greatest musicians, singers and players of musical instruments, are at the command of every family, of every mother and father, of every child.

It is impossible to predict the wonderful results that will come to the human race in a few generations from this making of GOOD MUSIC UNIVERSAL.

Wherever the father and mother will it, the children may hear from their infancy the works of genius, the greatest composers, the most wonderful artists.

Painful labor and the unsatisfactory results of musical study are done away with.

There are many presents, useful and otherwise, that may be appropriately given.

But for the home that lacks the singing and talking machine, with an equipment of good records, music gay and light, music serious and noble, there is but one gift to be thought of.

The greatest addition to the education of man since the days of Gutenberg is the machine that does for music what the printing press did for books and knowledge.

If you haven't in your house a machine that makes all music and all artists your own, GET ONE.

A man would feel himself disgraced if one, entering his house, should ask: "Have you a book in this house?" The answer would be: "Do you suppose that we are not civilized?"

If you own a new SILVERTONE, you may buy a 5-inch Little Wonder record, a 10-inch SILVERTONE, a 12-inch Victor or Columbia, a 14-inch Pathé, any Edison record, or any other disc record of any make or size, and the SILVERTONE will play it.

The new SILVERTONES retain all the sweetness of tone, musical expression and volume of sound which have stamped the earlier models as instruments of quality. The cabinet designs have not been greatly changed. But mechanically the present models have been vastly improved. This is virtually a new line of instruments. To clearly distinguish them from the former models the letter "B" has been prefixed to the model number in each case.

#### How We Play All Records.

Prominent among the improvements which have been made is the Convertible Tone Arm. We have examined many so-called "combination reproducers," which, it was claimed, would play all records, but we have never seen one which would play them well and play them without injuring the records.




FIG. 1.—Reproducer Set to Play Lateral Cut Records. position. There is no possibility of jarring or shattering the musical tones or of injury to the record.

So we began careful, scientific experiments of our own which finally resulted in the perfection of our Convertible Tone Arm, with which every "B" SILVERTONE is now equipped. This arm allows the reproducer to be shifted from the playing position for lateral cut records, such as SILVERTONE, Victor and Columbia (see Figure 1) to the position for playing vertical cut records, such as Edison and Pathé (see Figure 2). Not only is the change quickly and easily made, but the reproducer is solidly fixed in either

Model B-XII is a beautiful cabinet instrument, done in the Louis Fifteenth Period style, finished in genuine mahogany, as shown in the upper illustration, or in quarter sawed oak, as illustrated below. The mahogany is specially selected, of beautiful grain, hand polished in a rich dark piano finish. The oak is as carefully chosen for its unusually fine grain. The oak cabinets may be had in a beautiful golden hand rubbed finish, or in the rich deep fumed oak finish now so popular. We particularly recommend the fumed oak finish as it harmonizes with almost any other furniture and is not so easily marred or scratched as other finishes.

The Cabinets are 45½ inches high, 20¾ inches wide and 22 inches deep. In the lower compartment there are eight shelves for record albums. The net weight of the mahogany Model B-XII, set up in your home, ready to play, is 89 pounds; 94 pounds in oak.

All Models B-XII have the SILVERTONE Reproducer and No. 2 SILVERTONE Convertible Arm, on which the reproducer may be set to play any make of disc record. All have the tone modulator by which the volume of sound may be regulated. (See page 825.) All exposed metal parts are heavily nickel plated. Extra powerful quiet running double spring motor. ## A Few Important Facts About Phonograph Needles and Their Use

The tone quality and the volume of sound your instrument gives depends largely upon the kind of needle used and the depth to which the needle is inserted in the needle holder. When the needle point extends well below the set screw the tone is softer and the volume is less.

It should be remembered that, with the finer steel needles, the tone is softer and the volume of sound not so great. The heavier the needle the greater the volume of



sound. So your needle should be carefully chosen with a view to the nature of the selection you wish to play and the place where it is to be played.

The Full Tone or the Half Tone Needles give the best results under usual conditions. They fit the groove in the record better than either the Soft or the Extra Loud Tone Needles, and afford both sweetness of tone and satisfactory volume. Haile's Modulator is an attachment for disc phonographs, by means of which soft tones are reproduced with any ordinary standard or loud tone needle. It eliminates the scratching and rasping sounds. The use of this modulator also adds greatly to the life of the record, as the needle is supported between elastic surfaces which permit it to "give" slightly with every curve in the record groove, thus lessening the shock to the delicate walls of the groove, and greatly decreasing wear. Haile's Modulator may be attached to any disc talking machine. It is put on or taken off just as easily as removed. By slightly turning the screw a modulator, it may be regulated over a wide range.

# Rates for Parcel Post Shipments

*Your postmaster will tell you the parcel post zone in which your postoffice is located, measuring from Chicago*


All merchandise shipped by mail takes parcel post rates. Packages up to 4 ounces in weight are carried at the rate of 1 cent an ounce, regardless of distance. Packages over 4 ounces are charged for by the pound. The rate per pound varies according to the distance, which is measured by the Government zone system, each zone covering a certain number

of miles from point of shipment. Distances and rates are shown in the table below. Packages carried by parcel post are handled just like any other mail matter. They are delivered to your box by your rural mail carrier if you live on a rural route, or delivered to your door if you live in a city where there is carrier service, or delivered to your local postoffice if you live where there is no carrier service.

Within Local Zone and Zones 1 and 2 packages up to 50 pounds in weight are carried. The limit of weight for all other zones is 20 pounds. Articles measuring more than 7 feet in length and girth combined cannot be shipped by parcel post.



When you return goods by parcel post, put the letter you write and the bills for the goods (if you have the bills) in an envelope and paste or tie the envelope securely to the outside of the package. In addition to the postage you put on the package, put a 2-cent stamp on the envelope.

# **EXPRESS RATES**

Tables showing the Express Rates per 100 pounds on goods shipped from Chicago to a number of cities in each state, these cities being used as a basis for figuring rates for all the towns in the immediate vicinity of each city. Your express agent will tell you the exact rates from Chicago to your home town and give you full information in reference to their delivery service. If there is no express agent at your shipping point you must send money to prepay express charges. If there is an agent you can pay the express charges when shipment reaches you. It is necessary to prepay only when there is no agent at your station.
